

A SUMMARY OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THE NEW ALMADEN QUICKSILVER COUNTY PARK ASSOCIATION

ON THE OCCASION OF THE

40TH YEAR
PIONEER DAY CELEBRATION

OCTOBER 8, 2022 AT THE CASA GRANDE NEW ALMADEN, CALIFORNIA Compiled by **Art Boudreault** for the 35th NAQCPA Pioneer Day in 2017 from the first ninety-eight issues of NAQCPA newsletters, with focus on the first ten years and augmented with his vast knowledge gained as the archivist for NAQCPA over several decades. Art engineered and deployed the first electronic historical archive data system used by County Parks and was a key contributor to the current Past Perfect system. **Ron Horii**, NAQCPA photographer and web master, provided the Pioneer Day summary table. **Mike Cox**, with assistance from electronic newsletter links provided by **Ron Horii**, added some recent and additional events. Item sources, if from the newsletters, are identified by issue with this symbol [Spring 1983].

I. PHRPOSE

The New Almaden Quicksilver County Park Association (NAQCPA) held its first board meeting on February 22, 1983, and established goals as follows:

- To increase public awareness, understanding, and enjoyment of the historical, recreational, biological, and geological resources of Almaden Quicksilver County Park.
- To encourage and facilitate community involvement (within the park) in the:
 - development, maintenance, and protection of recreation facilities;
 - b. commemoration, restoration, interpretation and protection of historical resources;
 - interpretation, management, and protection of natural resources; and,
 - d. establishment and operation of interpretive programs and facilities. [Apr 1983]

II. IMPORTANT SPECIAL EVENTS

A. NAOCPA Board

The initial Board of Directors was elected in April 1983. It includes **Kitty Monahan**, **Dick Forst**, **Nancy Mason**, **Bob Clement**, **Scott Denham**, **Fred Celsi**, **Mike Cox**, **Kay Carmody**, **Steve Lorenz**, **and Peggy Melbourne**. [Apr 1983]

NAQCPA logo selected and accepted. [Apr 1983]

Board establishes priorities and begins regular monthly Board meetings and schedules regular annual events in Quicksilver County Park, including Pioneer Day and Trail Days.

NAQCPA incorporated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit. [8/1984]

NAQCPA has 500 members. [Fall 1994]

NAQCPA signed memorandum of understanding with Parks Department. [Aug 1997]

Kitty Monahan transfers her position to Tere Johnson, the new and second President of NAQCPA. Tere grew up in Almaden Valley and descends from James Job and Eliza Kessell, who lived and worked on the Hill. Active members support new Board comprised of Tere Johnson, President; Mike Cox, Vice President; Art Boudreault, Treasurer; Lisa Laymon, Secretary; and Board Members (Directors) Kitty Monahan, Sue McLain, Ron Horii, and Richard Williams. Lynda Will is the County Parks Liaison to NAQCPA. [Summer 2022]

B. Santa Clara Quicksilver County Parks

Larry Norris, New County Parks and Recreation Director, was appointed in April. [Apr 1983]

Possible acquisition of Rosetto property for Santa Teresa park. [Jan 1984]

County Parks purchases **Connie Perham's** original New Almaden Museum collection and leases her museum building until the new interpretive center is built at the Hacienda. [Sep 1986]

Park is a priority cleanup site by the State Department of Toxic Substances Control [Dec 1986] culminating in a five-stage remediation plan [05/1987]. The California Department of Health Services (later Toxic Substances Control) initially (late-1970s) ranked the New Almaden mines property number 215 out of 222 priority abandoned industrial sites involving mercury.

Jacques Ridge added to county park. [Fall 1994]

Reception for Paul Romero, new parks director. [Jan 1996]

Casa Grande is offered for sale to County Parks. [Fall 1996]

Purchase of Casa Grande close to completion. [Summer 1997]

As of 12/31/1997, Casa Grande is now owned by parks. [Winter 1997-1998]

Constance Perham retires and closes her museum at the Carson House. [Winter 1997-1998] The museum was built in 1949 and opened 1950.

New museum and interpretive center at Casa Grande opens on Pioneer Day with 54 docents. [Summer 1998]

Robbie Lamons is Director of the Museum. [Spring 1999]

John Slenter becomes a staff member of museum. [spring 2000]

Paul Romero, Parks Director, retires. [Spring 2002] **Lisa Killough** becomes Parks Director.

Casa Grande Renovation begins in fall 2008. [Winter 2008]

Casa Grande reopened in fall of 2010.

VII. QUICK FACTS

Half of park is within the boundaries of the New Almaden National Historic Landmark District.

Indigenous peoples were the first miners- digging a tunnel into the Hill reportedly about 100 feet long. No one knows how long the indigenous people mined the ore, perhaps hundreds if not thousands of years before European contact. Their name for the ore was reportedly mohetka and they called the place pooyi.

New Almaden was originally named La Mina de Santa Clara when first claimed by Andres Castillero in November of 1845 and was the first officially filed mining claim in California and the first mercury mining claim in North America.

100 species of wildflowers occur in the park.

New Almaden is possibly the richest single 19th-Century mine in the State, having gross receipts of about \$60-million dollars over its history, nearly all of which came from the singular New Almaden mine.

At its peak population of about 2,600 persons in the 1870s, roughly ten percent of the population of Santa Clara County lived at the mines.

New Almaden produced just under 86,000,000 pounds of mercury.

There are 18 principal vertical mining shafts in the Park and about 330 mine openings of other types, such as tunnels (opens to surface in more than one place) and adits (opens to surface in only one place). All are closed except for a few remote locations, and three have ventilation closures (the Cora Blanca mine, the San Cristobal Tunnel, and the M-66 2nd-Exit vent in the San Francisco opencut.

The mine workings on published maps measure at 49 miles in the main mine and an additional five miles in the other "outside mines," but estimating mileage in the individual stopes is error prone and the estimate does not include perhaps 5 miles of workings above the 300-level. The QSMC reported the mine to comprise about 100 miles of workings.

VIII. OBITUARIES

James Madison Arbuckle (1935 - 2007), San Jose historian. [Sep 2007]

John Franklin Atwood (1944 – 1921), the last professional mine surveyor on the Hill. Worked for New Idria Mining and Chemical Company at the New Almaden Quicksilver Mine from November 1968 until September 1969. John was a dedicated NAQCPA member and Board member and made significant contributions in organizing and photographing maps and drawings of the New Almaden mines in the archives, developing displays to illuminate the surveyor's craft and tools, delivering talks, and helping with all manner of work projects around the museum and park. John was a professional surveyor with the County of Santa Clara for 33 years. John was a member of the Cambrian Art League. He served as a Quartermaster during the Vietnam War aboard the USS Gridley (DLG-21) where he became an Honorable Shellback in the realm of King Neptune.

Dr. Edgar H. Bailey (1915 - 1983), mercury commodity geologist for the U.S. Geological Survey and 20th-Century expert on California geology. Lead author of Geology and Quicksilver Deposits of the New Almaden District, Santa Clara County, CA, USGS Professional Paper 360, 1964 [9/1983]

R Bert Barrett (1884- 1959), his arm is buried at New Almaden in the Hacienda cemetery. [Dec 1999]

Dick Barrett (1911 - 2005), Mercury News local history writer. [Dec 2005]

Mary Lee Baiocchi (1934 – 2020), long-time NAQCPA member and docent at the Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum. As the granddaughter and daughter of New Almaden Quicksilver mine workers, she had a strong connection to the rich history of the area. She served as a history docent for over 30 years at the New Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum and served on the board of the New Almaden Quicksilver County Park Association, activities that she shared with her lifelong friend Kitty Monahan. She was recognized as the Santa Clara County Parks Volunteer of the Year in 2006 and was noted for numerous other volunteer and charitable activities.

Sarah Boudreault (1933 - 2008), wife of Art Boudreault, NAQCPA volunteer, provided food for parties, supported Pioneer Days [Summer 1998]

Hank Calloway, noted historian, preservationist, artist, and NAQCPA member. [summer 1995]

Geraldine Camilleri- Behme (1919 - 1988), with husband **Reno "Andy" Camilleri**, operated Andy's Pet Shop on N 1st St. in San Jose and funded rebuilding of the Mine Hill rotary furnace plant in 1956. The 30-ton-perday plant processes ore for independent miners. They called this "Andy's Mercury Retort, Inc." The company also made the San Francisco and America mine open cuts on the Hill, in search of shallow mercury ore.

Kay Carmody (1917 - 2001), avid horsewoman, returned from safari to Victoria Falls in Zambia three weeks before she died. Kay was a close friend to Kitty, and Kitty wrote these words in memory of her: "It is with deep sorrow that I announce the death of our dear friend, Kay Carmody. Kay was a founding member of our Association and on the Board for as long as we have been in existence. She made each of our board meetings enjoyable with her humor and dedication to the Quicksilver Park. Her love of the Park showed in the many days she rode her horse, first Shotgun and then HiTops, and worked on trails and helped with Pioneer Days. [Jul 2001]

Albert DeRome (1885 - 1959), painting of Guadalupe Mine. [Dec 2005]

John Richard Drew III (1930-1922) Fourth generation of Cornish Drew mining family who came to California in 1850 and settled in New Almaden in 1884. Ardent supporter of the NA Museum and volunteer docent. John's grandfather, John Drew, worked at the mines for over forty years and was the Superintendent of mines that oversaw the opening and development of the Senator mine, an enterprise that kept many miners gainfully employed at held off bankruptcy for a time during the closing days of the Quicksilver Mining Company at the turn of the 19th-century.

Leroy Epperson restored the cabinet that was in the Mine Office. [Summer 1998]

Gina Farnquist (1939 - 2002), charter member of the Board of Directors of the "Christmas in the Park Parade." [Winter 2004]

Friedolin Kessler (1913 - 1995), one of the WPA's most exceptional artists, worked as a CCC volunteer, created the linoleum cuts of New Almaden that line the hallway between the living rooms and mining rooms at the New Almaden Museum, and erected a monument to the CCC in Englishcamp. [summer 1995]

Lisa Killough (1955 - 2016), Parks director, instrumental in supporting the Casa Grande restoration and NAQCPA activities.

Dutch Mapes (1915 - 2009), Professional Mason and contractor, Masonry Institute instructor, he completed the Tillman monument at age 92. Expert Horseman and trail guide,' often taking long trips in back country with wife **Nancy Mapes**. [Dec 2010]

Sydney Lee Melbourne (1936 – 2021), resident of New Almaden since 1970 with wife of sixty-four years, Peggy (né Carter), and beautiful daughters Julie Melbourne - Weaver and Dawna Melbourne. Syd was a constant loving and welcoming presence in the community, whether on reliably consistent daily runs and walks or helping out at all community events, including Pioneer Day. Syd, with Peggy, stood among Kitty Monahan's closest friends and were great supporters and volunteers for the Community Club, Park, and Museum.

David Miller built the blacksmith office at Casa Grande. [Summer 1998]

Dorothy Minkel (1921 - 2007), New Almaden Postmaster. [Apr 2007]

Robert F. Meyer (1940-2010), Bob was a resident of New Almaden, a Board member of NAQCPA, and a consistent and constant volunteer for all manner of activities. Bob was especially committed to Pioneer Day, trail building, docenting, and scanning records for the museum's Past Perfect database.

Kathleen "Kitty" Louise Monahan (1932 – 2022) Words are entirely inadequate to describe the love and contribution this "force of nature" gave to the world. Kitty was ever-smiling, always thinking ahead, and always working for a positive and brighter future. Her contributions are merely scratched at herein. A host of angels rejoiced at her arrival. May we hold her memory dear and pray that legions will rise to fill the void left by her passing, for legions is what will be required.

Virl 0. Norton, (1915 - 1995), won Great American Horse Race of 1976, noted as an expert horseman and for taming two Zebras and training them to pull a sulky cart. [April 1995]

Constance B Perham (1909 - 2001), founded Almaden Museum in 1949. [Jan 2001]

Dr. John Rowe (1915 - 2003), author of many books about the Cornish in America. [Dec 2007]

John Joseph Slenter (1941-1921) was a professional window dresser for J.C. Penny stores. John joined the Association and Board early on, and after

he retired from Penny's he began working as a docent at the New Almaden Museum when it was relocated to the Casa Grande. John was immediately noted for his ability to assemble top-quality educational displays and he was hired by the Parks Department as the principal interpreter for the museum. When the museum was removed from the Casa Grande during the building restoration, John took advantage and assembled exceptional displays that eclipse the first installations. John was active in many historical societies and was especially fond of Bodie, CA, where he spent time each year volunteering.

Ray Stark (1910 - 1999), member of independent miners working in the 1920s and 1930s on the Hill. Lived in shack near the Buena Vista shaft circa 1926-1936. Often said, "Everything is going to turn out all right." [Aug 1999]

Patrick Tilman (1976 - 2004), New Almaden native, professional football player, died fighting for USA in Afghanistan. [Spring 2007]

Dr. Arthur Cecil Todd, (1909- 2003), Cornish scholar with an acute interest in New Almaden. [winter 2003]


